

# Designated Public Sector and Multi-Year Accessibility Plans

#### What You Need to Know

Ontario Regulation (O. Reg.) 191/11 – Integrated Accessibility Standards under the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 (AODA) requires designated public sector organizations to have a multi-year accessibility plan in place which documents the organization's strategy to prevent and remove accessibility barriers.

Organizations must establish, review and update these plans in consultation with persons with disabilities and when applicable, with a municipal accessibility advisory committee.

Plans must be updated at least once every five years and a status report must be completed on an annual basis. The plan and status report must be posted on the organization's website and be available in an accessible format upon request.

This form includes information to help designated public sector organizations comply with section 4 of the Regulation.

There is ongoing general initiatives which the Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC) continues to work with Town and District Staff to ensure barriers to accessibility are minimized and or eliminated. This includes ongoing provision of feedback to the District with respect to the setting of priorities for the installation of audible signals to meet the deadline of 2025. Additionally, the AAC has been reviewing parking space sizes and accessible parking space locations in preparation of a reconstruction of Manitoba Street expected by 2024. Through the AAC, the Town continued to recognize National Access Awareness Week through a media release and promotional banner in an effort to increase the awareness of barriers for those with disabilities. The planning for the new multi-use community centre (Muskoka Lumber Community Centre) continued in 2020. The facility includes an ice/arena, library and field house along with trails and other public space. It has been developed using the 7 Principles of Universal Design to be fully accessible and inclusive. The planning and installation of the accessible playground at Kirby's Beach and upgrades to parking at Kirby's Beach Park area. Final planning and construction for Salmon Avenue (new street) was completed that includes a multi-use trail alongside. ✓ Applicable Not applicable

All municipalities with 10,000 and more residents must establish an accessibility advisory committee. Obligated organizations are also required to consult with the public and persons with disabilities when building new trails and outdoor play spaces. The Town's Accessibility Advisory Committee (AAC) was established many years ago with the current committee apopinted for the 2018-2022 term of Council. The committee is consulted with regularly by staff in the development, review and updating of the Multi-year Plan.

In February of 2020, the Town launched the Engage Bracebridge online community engagement tool which will serve as the main community consultation hub for any projects undertaken by the Town where community engagement is required. This site is web-based and is fully accessible.

The first project to be highlighted on Engage Bracebridge was the new Multi Use Community Centre (MUCC - named the Muskoka Lumber Community Centre in 2021). A "in-person" series of consultations on this new facility were undertaken in February 2020 and included meetings with the AAC. A number of design sessions were held with the MUCC Working Group and the AAC that dealt with planning for different aspects of the project (ice arena, library and field house along with the grounds and surrounding public space/trail).

As a result COVID-19 with restrictions placed on in-person meetings (Council, Committees), the Town worked quickly to put in Electronic Meeting Protocols for all meetings of Council and Committees. This ensure ongoing access as all meetings are webcast and recorded. All recordings are closed captioned.

The public and the Town's AAC provided input into a 5 year business plan for the Bracebridge Transit and Bracebridge Mobility services. It is expected the plan and recommendations would be presented to Council in 2021.

The AAC was consulted on a proposed pathway that would be parallel to the water at Annie Williams Park and would link up with the existing parking lot access point; and proposed upgrades to the Wilson's Falls Trail System (wilderness trail) looking at the potential to increase areas of access for those with mobility challenges.

The AAC continued to be heavily involved with the upgrades to Kirby's Beach with the final aspect being the installation of a fully accessible playground. The Committee provided feedback on proposed equipment in the playground and other aspects to the beach that required further attention. The AAC has had a goal that this park be fully accessible and has been working on this since 2016. The playground is the final feature.

Consultations took place with pickleball, basketball and ball hockey users to determine the utilization for court facilities at Kerr Park and Kelvin Grove Park.

#### **Next Steps**

The Town's 5 year business plan for Bracebridge Transit and Mobility will be approved

The Downtown Master Plan will be approved

While upgrading/installing new sidewalks, tactile plates are being installed at pedestrian crossings (2021 work includes Andrea Drive, Morrison Street and Oakwood Heights)

Community Consultation for a Communications Plan for the Town

Community Consultation for a Fire Master Plan

Public Consultation will be undertaken with users of the Strawberry Point Trail network (wilderness trail) to understand the interaction with multi-modal users

Kerr Park and Kelvin Grove Park Court facilities upgraded to reflect input from users/public

Design of accessible access at Bowyer's Beach

Construction of accessible pathway at Annie Williams Park

Design of new playground in new residential development (Clearbrook Phase 10) with accessible playground/fitness features and surfacing
